Connected Charities

The parish has two connected charities: The Church Society (The Christchurch Fund) and St. Mark's Gilbert Scott Trust. Details are contained in Notes 13 & 14 to the accounts.

OBJECTIVES and ACTIVITIES

The PCC of St Mark's has the responsibility of cooperating with the Vicar in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church: pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. The PCC also has maintenance responsibilities for the church building and hall complex, along with oversight of the finances.

The parish seeks to play a full part in the life of the Diocese, and supports its work through the parish share. The Diocese supports St Mark's through the provision of the vicar and their housing. The parish is also committed to supporting the activities of the Warwick and Leamington Deanery.

Mission Statement and Values

The church's mission statement is founded upon Jesus' great commandment and His great commission – John 13:34, Matthew 28:18-20:

Our mission is to be a community of believers in Jesus Christ who are devoted to loving God, loving others, making disciples.

The mission statement expresses the heart of the church, and is lived out through Sunday worship and through the Small Groups, to which all church members are encouraged to belong.

The values of the church are centred on the eight essential qualities of healthy churches identified by Natural Church Development and promoted by the diocese: loving relationships, holistic small groups, inspiring worship, gift based ministry, needs-based outreach, functional structures, passionate spirituality and empowering leadership.

The church became an 'inclusive church', a member of a network of churches which have a vision that celebrates and affirms every person, and does not discriminate. (www.inclusive-church.org)

Premises

The church is a Grade II* listed building. A quinquennial inspection was carried out in March 2020. At the time of writing of this report, we do not have the architect's written report. It is likely that there are a number of significant items that will need attention over the next few years.

Essential preventative maintenance is carried out as required.

In early 2019, the stone flooring in the nave and aisles was repaired or replaced following varied amounts of deterioration.

The hall rooms are not part of the listing. As well as use by the church groups, the rooms in the hall complex are available for hire by community groups on a fair commercial basis.

The church is also available for use or hire by others, and has been used by other organisations for a number of concerts.

Steven Matthews of Brown Matthews Architects was engaged in 2017 as church architect.

Legal

We believe that we conform to all legal requirements such as those related to finance, health and safety, kitchen standards, employment, GDPR etc.

Electoral roll and church attendance

At the 2019 Annual Parochial Church Meeting the electoral roll was 145, after a full review of the roll (2018: 181).

The following attendance figures include all those attending regular Sunday services within the buildings of St Mark's during the year. When a joint morning service was held, figures are included as the 9.30 service. Average attendances were:

Where not known, the assumption used for adjustment for multiple attendances is that 3 adults at 11.15 service, and 40% of 6.30pm service attendees had attended an earlier service.

Total attendances at Christmas services (Carol service, Christingle, Christmas Eve and Christmas day) were 871 adults and 391 under16s (2018: 1038 and 490) (though it should be noted that the Christingle total may be very inaccurate, and it is now considered that the 2018 figure was a significant overestimate).

Review of the Year - 2019

2019 was the second full year of the new Vicar, Revd. Joanna Parker, who was installed on 6th September 2017.

Sunday Worship

St Mark's is well resourced and we continue to offer two or three principal services of worship on Sundays, with some joint services for major festivals.

Each of the weekly services has its own distinctive style:

 the 9.30 am service continues to be relatively informal in character, within a framework of appropriate liturgy. A significant feature is the involvement of children for part of the services, with groups also meeting separately during most services. A family service (parade in term time) is usually held on the second Sunday in the month involving the uniformed groups which are linked to St Mark's.

- At the monthly communion service on the first Sunday, the children and any youth return to be present at Communion after their own Kids Praise or group sessions.
- the 11.15 am service is a Common Worship service of Holy Communion or Morning Worship with hymns and some sung liturgy.
- the evening service, at 6.30pm, is more informal, with band led worship and opportunities for informal prayer and sharing.
- During August, we held morning services at 10.30am, along with the evening services.

Non-Sunday services

We also hold services for all the major festival days, most notably throughout holy week and Easter, and those related to Christmas.

Small Groups

There are nine adult Small Groups; they generally meet weekly. The groups are at the heart of church life and a great strength of St Mark's with about 80 church members regularly attending them (as at December 2019). Each group is led by one or two leaders and the group structure includes a co-ordinator to support, encourage and equip the leaders and group members.

Small groups are an important place for building relationships, for pastoral care, and for encouraging and supporting each other in our Christian journey. They are also a channel to bring new people to faith. The vision is that each group will experience growth and multiply, i.e. growing both spiritually and numerically, recognizing that small groups are indispensable to healthy church life.

Prayer

Prayer, both personal and corporate, continues to be essential to the life of the church. We aim to offer Prayer ministry after every service.

Baptisms, Marriages and Funerals

As a Church of England parish, the church is available for parish residents and church members for the main life events. During 2019, five marriage services were held, along with three baptisms, and one thanksgiving. Four funerals were held in the church with an additional two full funeral services conducted at the crematorium.

Weekend away

We held a weekend away in September, when about 60 adults and 15 young people met for the weekend at Cleobury Mortimer, for a mix of teaching and socialising.

Steve Tilley led the adults on four sessions on the theme of hunger: physical, emotional, spiritual and intellectual. The young people had their own sessions, some being active. Much time was available for getting to know each other more, with a walk, or cafe time, and an evening quiz.

Church Development Plan

Early in the year, we asked all members of the congregation for their ideas and hope for the future that could be put into a 5 year development plan. There were many responses, some of which were

minor detail issues that have been dealt with; others being major projects which will need time and resources. All the issues have been listed under 5 themes: Worship, premises, governance, community outreach and community inreach. It is hoped that many of the congregation will be involved in moving these plans forward.

Young people

Ros Davies is our Children and Families worker. She has continued to coordinate any school related activities, and the running of Sunday and weekday children's activities.

Schools

The parish of New Milverton contains two (non church) primary schools, a Roman Catholic secondary school and Royal Leamington Spa College. The Children and Families Worker has worked with Milverton and Brookhurst School on a regular basis, visiting Milverton weekly, and Brookhurst at least once each term.

Both schools held their Harvest and Christmas assemblies in church.

We open the church for the schools, and uniformed groups, to attend 'Experience events', at Easter, Harvest and Christmas

Nursery schools, Little Angels and Emscote House have used the church for events, bringing in their parents and others to watch.

Children and staff from Caterpillar nursery visited the church to watch Milverton's assemblies and nativity at Christmas.

Children

The children's work is an integral part of the church's ministry.

Sunday morning groups are available for children and young people up to School Year 9, with typically 15 to 20 children attending weekly; 40+ for all age/ parade services.

Toddlers, held weekly, attracts about 25 families. "Play and Praise Noah's Ark" session for preschool children their parents and carers also has 25+ families typically attending.

We hold occasional extra children's activities, such as the Christmas tree decoration.

We also held an Easter fun day and a number of Summer fun days in the school holidays, primarily aimed at those who do not normally attend St Mark's.

Youth

We currently have few people that fit the youth age group, but we restarted Pathfinders, which runs for children from year 6, 3 weeks out of 4.

Uniformed Organisations

A full range of uniformed organisations are attached to the church; Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, Beavers, Cubs and Scouts number over 100 children in total. The groups meet on the church's premises and are encouraged to attend the monthly family services (parade services in term time).

Outreach and Community support

During the year the church has continued to engage in outreach in the community. St Mark's works with other churches in the town, particularly in respect of Nightlight (a project based at All Saints offering refreshments and a listening ear to late night clubbers), Street Pastors, Cyrenians halfway house, and the Financial Freedom project run by Christians Against Poverty.

We hold a number of weekly activities for young families. The Toddler Club provides a weekly opportunity for parents, carers and toddlers to meet. The Praise and Play group is held for preschool children and their parents and carers.

The church is open every Wednesday morning for light refreshment and chat/prayer/quiet space for local people

We hold a monthly lunch for retired people, FIRS (Friends in Retirement).

A team of volunteers support the chaplaincy at Royal Leamington Spa College, being present for a few hours every week.

The church is used for occasional events, most particularly school events, for the schools and their parents.

A number or our special services also act as outreach, most particularly our Christmas Carol service and the Christingle service held on the afternoon of Christmas Eve. Christingle is the single biggest service in the year

We open the church for the annual September Heritage weekend; an opportunity for the public to visit.

Starting January 2019, a Christianity Explored course was run.

Other events

Concerts

The church is hired out occasionally for public musical concerts. In June, Divermento held a concert. During December 2019, Carice singers held one, arranged by Leamington Music.

Social events

We hold a small number of social events to which church members invite others. Any proceeds may be for external charities.

Mission Support

St Mark's tithes 10% of general income and is committed to supporting the work of mission worldwide and locally through finance, information and prayer, as well as individual initiatives from within the Church – such as Operation Christmas Child, Scripture Union Bible reading notes, Night Light, Street Pastors and Foodbank.

In 2019, the organisations that received financial support are listed later in note 5.

The Group Report has more details and the mission notice board at the back of church is kept up to date with the latest news.

Pastoral Care

Strategy

Pastoral care is always a priority for the church. The PCC continues to support pastoral care. We expect that everyone in the congregation will potentially be involved in pastoral care, especially through the Small Groups which are a key part of our pastoral care.

Pastoral Care is coordinated through the office, supporting a team of volunteers.

Safeguarding

The PCC of St Mark's is wholly committed to the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults. The Parish Safeguarding Officer, Laura-Jayne Ward (previously Ann Parsons), oversees the DBS certification and safeguarding training of volunteers working with children and vulnerable adults, and ensures that the church complies with diocesan safeguarding procedures and policies. The PCC continues the process of approving job descriptions for volunteer children's and pastoral assistants.

The PCC has adopted the Diocese of Coventry's Safeguarding Policy, which complies with the guidance issued by the House of Bishops. A copy can be found on the notice boards in the church.

Staff, Readers and Clergy Matters

Children and Families Work Coordinator

The PCC continued to employ Ros Davies as our Children and Families Work Coordinator.

Office Administrator

The PCC seeks to maintain an office open for at least 4 hours every day, staffed appropriately. Amanda di Giovanni and Sheila Robinson hold the role as a job share.

Cleaner

A part time cleaner continues to clean for the hall areas.

Readers

We currently have three Readers licensed to the parish: Marie Calvert, Amanda di Giovanni, Dr Yvonne Warren.

Vicar - Rev. Joanna Parker

Rev. Joanna Parker remains as Vicar, having previously been Vicar of St George's, Hyde, Greater Manchester. Rev. Jo was installed as Vicar of St Mark's on 6th September 2017.

The challenges of 2020

At the time of publication, the global issue of the corona-virus is significantly disrupting normal life across the UK and world, including our local church life. In common with the Church of England, our aim is to provide help with community support, and also to think creatively about how to continue with our mission. In particular, we are doing Sunday services by live streaming. Ros Davies, children's worker is currently on furlough and not working for the church.

We are also aware that most of us, at some time, will also need to focus on personal or family needs at least for a time, distracting us from the church mission. We pray that God will guide us, as a church and as a nation, through this time.

Financial Review

The detailed accounts appear on pages 11-21

Unrestricted Funds

In 2019 unrestricted fund income of £162.9k covered unrestricted expenditure of £161.9k, resulting in a surplus for the year of £1.0k (2018: £5.1k deficit). Total planned giving to unrestricted funds was £131.2k (2018: £110.9k), thanks to our very generous congregation.

Legacies totalling £1.9k (2018: £11.1k) were received

Income from trading activities (which includes premises letting and concerts) stood at £26.6k (2018: £28.4k)

Expenditure on unrestricted general funds amounted to £146.9k for 2019 (2018: £144.6k). Our Diocesan parish share was £68.0k (2018:£68.0k). Staff costs were £38.0k (2018 £37.8k). Premises and maintenance expenditure in 2019 was £6.6k compared with £7.0k in 2018. £5.8k was paid out of the designated fund mainly for repairs to the church floor.

During the year the church was committed to pay £15.0k (2018: £13.0k) in tithes. The total tithe paid represented 10% of total income received in the year (measured on a cash rather than accruals basis)

Restricted Funds

In restricted funds, expenditure exceeded income by £15.6k due mainly to repairs to the stone floor. This was paid out of monies received in previous years from generous donations.

Balance Sheet

At 31 December 2019, total cash and short-term deposit balances stood at a £119.7k (2018: £134.5k). The church has total net assets of £298.2k (2018: £318.7k). A reduction due mainly to payments from the restricted and designated funds.

Reserves

During 2019 it cost around £12.2k per month to keep the church going, not allowing for any major repair work. The reserves in the unrestricted fund stand at £50.7k (2018: £49.7k), representing approximately 4 month's expenditure. The PCC believes that this is an acceptable level of reserves which will act as a buffer for any unforeseen events. It is also in line with good accounting practice.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2019

1 Accounting Policies

a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the FRS 102 SORP. In preparing the financial statements, the PCC of St Mark's follows best practice as set out in the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2015).

b) Fund Accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the PCC of St Mark's and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donors or which have been raised by the PCC of St Mark's for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged to the specific fund.

c) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the PCC of St Mark's is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Income from letting of the premises is included in the period in which the PCC is entitled to the receipt.

Gifts in kind donated for distribution are included at valuation and are recognised when received.

Grants and legacies are accounted for when the PCC is legally entitled to the amounts due. Interest is included when receivable by the charity.

d) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Grants and donations are accounted for when paid, or when awarded if the award creates a binding or constructive obligation on the PCC.

e) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Consecrated and benefice property are not included in the accounts in accordance with the SORP, as it is not possible to obtain an appropriate valuation for the church building. All expenditure incurred during the year on such property, whether maintenance or improvement, is written off on purchase or acquisition.

No value is placed on the church hall complex as this is regarded as an integral part of the church.

Moveable church fittings held by the vicar and churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal, are inalienable property, and are listed in the

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation (Cont'd)

church's inventory which can be inspected during office hours. For such furnishing acquired prior to 1 January 2000 there is insufficient cost information available and therefore such assets are not valued in the financial statements.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment uses within the church premises are depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful life ranging from 3 to 10 years. Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of £750 or less are written off in the year of expenditure. Assets donated to the PCC are not included with fixtures and fittings.

4 Staff costs and reimbursed expenses

During the year there were no employment or housing costs, other than those specified below. The employment costs for the vicar (when in post) were paid by the Diocese. Since 1 September 2015 staff have had the option to join the Church of England Church Workers Pension Fund.

On average during 2019 the PCC employed 1 full time and 3 part time people, who each earned less than £60,000 per annum. No members of the PCC received a salary whilst a member of the PCC.

No PCC members were reimbursed for personal (travel/subsistence) expenses (2018 £0).

Restricted funds: Fabric funds

These represent donations made for the improvement and major maintenance of the church building and hall complex and equipment and include:

Anonymous donations were given for the general improvement of the premises. The balance was spent this year on repairs to the stone floor

The Christ Church fund received money from the Church Society, who was holding unspent income on a fund for the benefit of St Mark's Church set up when the Christ Church in Leamington Spa was closed. The balance was spent this year on repairs to the stone floor.

Upper room fund was set up to finance the improvement of facilities for young people of the parish.

Organ fund represents donations made for improvement and major maintenance of the church organ.

Restricted funds: Special fund-raising funds

The Flower fund helps raise money to purchase flowers for the church

East Window Protection fund was set up in 2015 to hold a donation received from the Gilbert Scott Trust for this specific purpose.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2019

Dishwasher/Oven fund was set up in 2015 to hold donations received towards a new dishwasher and oven for the main church kitchen. The expenditure was capitalised in 2018 and is being written off over the following 7 years.

The Mission Partnership fund represents amounts specifically given for mission work (including specific collections during the year).

The House fund represents the flat at 20 Brookhurst Court, donated to the PCC. The PCC agreed that this would be placed in a restricted house fund until 1 February 2022.

Unrestricted funds

General fund: available for use by the PCC and not subject to external restrictions or internally determined designations.

Designated

Building fund: the amount agreed by the PCC to be put aside to finance future building work, less expenditure on the stone floor.

Music fund: The PCC had received a donation of a Steinway grand piano in the 1950s. It required over £10k to restore it and the PCC decided to sell it in 2018. The money is being held in a designated fund to be spent on music.

11 Capital commitments

There were no capital commitments at 31 December 2019 (2018: £17.0 plus VAT, re stone floor repairs)

12 Related party transactions
