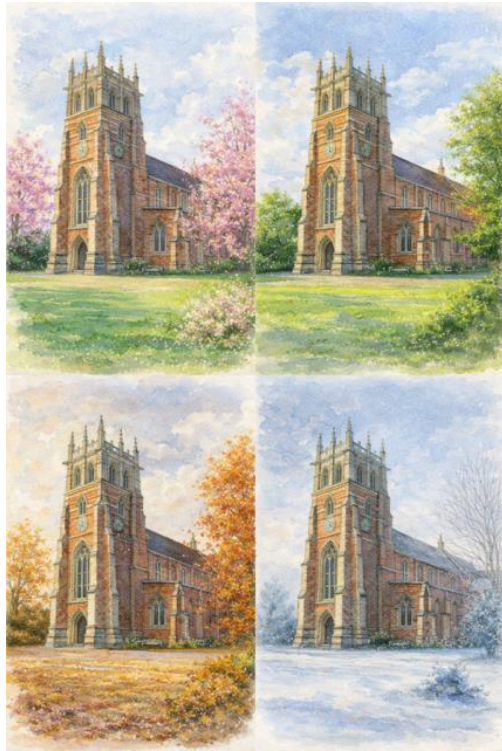

This is a collection of reports about the activities that have taken place over the last year from the many groups that make up the body of St Mark's. It is in addition to the 'Annual Report and Financial Statements of the PCC', the official report from the Parochial Church Council and Vicar.

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Introduction

Thank you for your interest in the life of St Mark's.

When I look at all we do as a church, it's clear to me that St Mark's is, at its heart, a remarkable volunteer community supported by just a few paid staff. Some of our groups meet weekly, others less often, but whenever they gather and whatever they do, they share one purpose: to further the work of St Mark's and, in doing so, to proclaim the name of Jesus.

Each invitation offered, every group that meets, and every space prepared for others is a quiet, powerful declaration that Jesus is still Lord in our lives. The life of St Mark's is not really about activities or rotas, it's about people. Ordinary people living extraordinary lives of service. Service offered in the name of Jesus.

Thank you for taking the time to read this document. And if you're involved in one of our groups, thank you for the part you play. I've been here nearly three years now, and it has been a joy to serve alongside so many of you.

Church weekend away

In June 2025, around fifty of us travelled to the Pioneer Centre in Cleobury Mortimer for a weekend that proved both refreshing and deeply enriching. With our speaker, Ruth Hassall, we explored the theme of Journeying Together through key passages in Luke's Gospel. Ruth invited us to reflect on what it means to grow in faith and walk in compassion, beginning with the story of the road to Emmaus in Luke 24, where Jesus draws alongside the disciples in their confusion. From there, we considered the challenge of the Good Samaritan, exploring how we might show practical mercy to those in need, and we spent time in Luke 7, reflecting on Jesus' welcome of the woman who anointed His feet and His call to bring those on the margins into the centre of community life. We

also considered the importance of bearing one another's burdens as we continue to journey in faith together.

Alongside the teaching, the Pioneer Centre offered plenty of opportunities to relax, have fun, and enjoy time together. Many of us took part in activities such as climbing, archery, abseiling, and the zip wire. Mealtimes were another highlight, with hearty food served in the large dining hall — though the sugar-free apple crumble was memorable for the wrong reasons.

The whole weekend strengthened our sense of belonging, gave space for rest and renewal, and reminded us of the joy of walking together as a church family.

Sunday Groups

Our Sunday Groups continue to flourish, with the Explorers group led by April Harris and Climbers, which I lead, supported by a dedicated and committed volunteer team. Using the Roots resource, we guide children in exploring the Bible and growing in their faith.

Each week, we begin with a warm welcome, share snacks and news, pray together, and say The Lord's Prayer. Children are encouraged to ask questions and take part in group discussions, helping them feel valued and deepening their understanding of the Bible. We also enjoy creative craft

activities, and, when time allows, play together to build fellowship and community.

Some of our young people volunteer with the groups as part of their Duke of Edinburgh Award, and it is a joy to have them share their gifts and energy with the children.

John Finlayson and Tim Lewington have begun running a group for under 4s, providing a welcoming space for parents and preschool children and helping families connect with the life and ministry of our church.

All-age services

Tim and I work closely to plan our All-Age services, and it has been wonderful to see our children and young people grow in confidence—especially in writing, leading prayers and reading from the Bible. We continue to explore creative and meaningful ways to involve them, incorporating multi-sensory activities, prayers, and opportunities to welcome others. Our services are relaxed and inclusive, ensuring everyone can feel part of our church community, no matter where they are on their journey of faith.

We also enjoy welcoming our uniformed groups to take part in selected All-Age services, adding to the sense of celebration and togetherness.

Baptisms and thanksgiving services

I coordinate enquiries and arrangements for baptisms and thanksgiving services. Tim and I visit families together beforehand, providing an opportunity to build relationships, offer support, and ensure that all families feel welcome and included. Through these visits, we aim to help families feel at ease and welcomed into the life of St Mark's as they prepare for these special occasions, reflecting the church's caring and welcoming presence in their lives.

Toddler group

Our Toddler group runs on Wednesday mornings, with Tim joining us for storytelling and a lively song time accompanied by guitar. We are encouraged to see many parents from the groups attending church services during the year. Families are also warmly invited to join us for

Easter craft activities on Good Friday, providing a welcoming space to connect with others and be part of the church community.

Summer fun – August outdoor family play sessions

Our August outdoor family play sessions, led by volunteer Nikki Hill and supported by other volunteers, were a great success and much enjoyed by all who attended. The sessions offered a relaxed and welcoming environment for families to have fun, spend time together, and connect with the wider church community.

Outdoor Nativity Trail

Our Outdoor Nativity Trail, featuring live animals, was a highlight of the Christmas season. Families from our community were warmly invited to take part, and it was enjoyed by so many. The event would not have been possible without the dedication of numerous volunteers who helped in a variety of ways, ensuring a welcoming and memorable experience for everyone.

Oliver Bowden and Ian Holden created a wonderful stable, with hay kindly provided by Peter Hambleton, which really added to the atmosphere. Some of our younger children were so taken with it that they believed it was a real stable!



Some of our four-legged guests were very popular with the children! Sidney Syson and Peter Hambleton, our wonderful shepherds, kept a watchful eye over the proceedings.



Christingle

The Christingle service continues to be a special occasion, bringing together many familiar faces and newcomers. For many families, it marks the start of their Christmas celebrations. It is wonderful to open our doors to the wider community, share the Christian message, celebrate this festive tradition, and raise funds for The Children’s Society, supporting children in need.

Schools’ ministry – Milverton and Brookhurst

This part of my ministry, serving within our local schools, continues to be a valued expression of St Mark’s presence in the community. Through this work, we can regularly connect with a significant number of children and families.

At Milverton, I am known as a Champion of Friends, supporting children as they learn how to build healthy friendships, work through difficulties, and grow in confidence.

I also serve as Chaplain at Brookhurst, offering a consistent Christian presence and pastoral support for both pupils and staff. In this role, I seek to gently and naturally bring the love of God into the everyday life of the school through conversation and moments of reflection, helping children encounter faith in meaningful, accessible ways.

At Milverton, I read Bible stories to Reception children. At both schools, I lead playground activities, organise prayer stations, and coordinate key events, including Christmas, Easter, and Harvest celebrations. These occasions are well attended and create meaningful opportunities for worship, reflection, and celebration across both schools.

Alongside this, I mentor children who benefit from one-to-one support. I also work alongside a teacher in Thera Play sessions, helping children develop trust, emotional security, and positive relationships. It is a real joy to see children grow in confidence as they begin to understand that they are valued, that their voices matter, and that they are truly seen and heard.

This ministry is ongoing and deeply relational. By continuing to be present in our schools, we are building trust, strengthening partnerships with staff, and helping children and families experience St Mark's as a caring and faithful presence in everyday life.

Emscote House Nursery

The annual nursery graduation service at St Mark's welcomes around 30 children, together with approximately 200 grandparents and staff. This joyful celebration marks the children's achievements and provides us as a church with an opportunity to share in their milestones, bless the children, and connect with their families.

Gratitude

I want to express my heartfelt thanks and deep gratitude to everyone who contributes to our children's ministry, in whatever capacity. Your time, energy, and faithfulness make this work possible, and so many people help in ways that are often unseen. As 1 Corinthians 12:27 reminds us: "Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it." I am also encouraged by Galatians 6:9: "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

Pathfinders

Pathfinders is a lively group for young people in Year 7 and above, led by us, with Colum Goodchild helping on the 1st and 4th Sundays. We meet in the upper room from 9.15 am for breakfast before starting at 10.00 am.

The group provides a welcoming space to explore faith, meet before the Sunday service for breakfast, connect, chat, and prepare. Each Sunday, we have games, activities, and Bible exploration, with time for reflection and prayer. This relaxed setting encourages big questions, growth in understanding of God, and friendship-building.

Recent topics include Jesus' commission and witnessing to friends; prayer helping us navigate change and anxiety; The Lord's Prayer; Halloween fun, not fear; All Souls Day; All Saints Day; Advent; Stir-up Sunday; and Christmas heroes. We have had fun socials with a pancake party, an Easter egg hunt, a summer party, and a Christmas party.

Extra help is urgently needed on the 3rd and 5th Sundays; please talk to us if you are interested.

Youth group – Uno

Our Wednesday evening youth group (known as 'Uno', chosen by the young people after their favourite card game) caters for those in Year 7 to Year 13, and is an absolutely fantastic group. They've formed a really tight-knit, welcoming community where they not only feel free to be truly themselves, but also to invite their friends! It's an absolute privilege to see them grow and explore together.

Meeting at 7 pm in the upper room during term time, a typical session consists of social time at the start (complete with food) where the young people are free to chat, catch up on the week, and play games; before moving into the theme of the week – usually rotating between a more

structured group game, activity, or a ‘Big Chat’ where we explore a Bible story, topic, or sometimes what’s been happening in the world that week. Every session ends with a space to go a little deeper into what’s going on in their lives and a time of prayer.

We tend to average around 10 young people a session (with as many as 15). At present, Uno is run by Tim and Rebecca (me, hello), with occasional other helpers – but we’d love more volunteers! If you’ve got a heart for seeing young people grow in faith and becoming who God has made them to be, whether or not you can spare a regular Wednesday night or just an occasional one, we’d love to hear from you!

Explore Together

In August 2025, St Mark’s held a series of six Explore Together Sunday sessions to create a more interactive, intergenerational approach to worship and learning. Each service began with a short time of sung worship and a Bible reading, after which the congregation chose between four parallel ways of exploring the theme: **Reflective** prayer stations, an **Attentive** short talk and discussion, an **Active** intergenerational game, or a **Creative** arts-and-craft activity. The congregation then gathered back together for closing worship, with participants invited to share reflections on an “August Wall” during refreshments afterwards.

The sessions explored six of Jesus’ “I am” sayings from John’s Gospel: the bread of life, the good shepherd, the way, the vine, the light of the world, and the resurrection and the life. Through discussion, games, crafts and prayer, participants reflected on themes such as what truly nourishes life, recognising and following God’s voice, finding direction and meaning, remaining connected to Christ, bringing light into dark places, and experiencing new life and hope through Jesus.

Across the series, the sessions encouraged people of all ages to engage with scripture in different ways – thinking, creating, playing and praying together – while reflecting on how these biblical images might shape everyday faith and life.

Small groups

Small Groups have an important role in fulfilling our vision statement: “Belonging... Believing... Becoming... A community of believers, sharing God’s love with the world.”

We have 9 groups with around 80 members. Most meet weekly on a Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday evening.

The groups use a variety of resources. Some follow the sermons and use questions set by the preacher; others are more adventurous and find resources to meet the group's needs.

Small groups provide a space to chat, read and discuss God’s word and how to apply it to our lives, and pray for one another.

Thank you to all the leaders, co-leaders, facilitators and hosts for your commitment over the year.

Together in meditation

We meet monthly on the first Thursday at 7.30 for 40 minutes of silence, followed by refreshments.

Before we begin our silent time together, we have a short introduction and a thought for the session. We have used St. Patrick's Breastplate, Elijah's "small voice of calm," and verses from the Psalms and the New Testament as areas of focus.

We have used different spaces in the church and hall, including sessions reflecting on church artworks, and used different objects to help our focus, including finger labyrinths, hazelnuts and stones.

We usually have between 4 and 8 people and have been able to offer calm contemplation amid busy lives.

Chaplaincy at Royal Leamington Spa College

This is our 10th year at Leamington College, and we continue to be encouraged and awe-struck at times by the special moments and conversations that unfold there.

Who and when? We are a small but dedicated team (Rani Clare, Pam Griffin Booth, Bev and Ray Kirton, Sandy Smith) who take it in turns to go into college one lunchtime a week during term time (usually a Monday).

Why? We do this because we believe God's love is for everyone and want to share it with those outside the church. We don't push anything, but we are allowed to share what our faith means to us, which is a huge privilege.

How? We hang around near our spot on the route to the refectory, and get into conversation with any students or staff who would like to talk – whether about everyday things, or something deeper. We offer sweets and blessings (written on strips of paper), and it is remarkable how often someone will come and say, 'I don't want a sweet today, but I do want one of these blessings'. Often, it turns out that the words are spot on for that person. We often meet people who are struggling with issues, for example, broken relationships/friendships, mental health problems, stress at home, etc.

One of our team members recently had a significant conversation with a student who was struggling to find any meaning in life, and that conversation was pivotal in helping them move forward.

Mission

One definition of mission is to join in with what God is doing in the world. In that respect we are all involved in mission. Some people are involved full-time, in paid or voluntary roles, through prayer and financial support.

St Mark's is committed to giving around 10% of our income to individuals and organisations working in various areas of mission. Details can be found in the Missionary and Charitable Giving section of the 2025 accounts.

Several people from St Mark's are involved with local mission groups such as Christians Against Poverty, Street Pastors and Flourish, so thank you to them.

Eco Church

This year has seen some changes due to increased paid employment and involvement in setting up an Eco Hub in Leamington Spa town centre. However, with some great volunteers, we have kept several projects going and adapted areas such as recycling, as kerbside collection has increased. The projects we currently have are:

- **Eco cupboard.** We have the use of a great cupboard, which has meant that recycling boxes have been moved from the pew area, and we can invest in larger items such as containers of washing-up liquid. This is very much appreciated.
- **Recycling.** We have reduced this by removing products that can now be put in the kerbside recycling, focusing on pens/biros, some dental items, spectacles, and cosmetics. Small collection boxes are available at the back of the church, which are emptied regularly.

- **Churchyard biodiversity and heritage project.** We are involved in the Coventry Diocesan project to develop environmental richness in churchyard spaces, and this spring we are attending the relevant meetings to see how this will be taken forward over the next few years.
- **Wildflower planting.** The wildflowers were reviewed as the planting with Warwickshire Wildlife Trust did not seem to take off. A new area of wildflowers was planted in March near the trees and may be expanded depending on how well they take! The bulbs are still successful, as is the hedging, and the bird boxes are also well used.
- **Suma products.** Good value products can now be bought on occasion from the back of the church, currently washing up liquid and hand soap, made possible by being able to buy in bulk. Very competitive prices and good for the environment!
- **Eco Fair.** We did not hold an Eco Fair in 2025, but another one is planned for Saturday 6th June 2026. We have several local environmental organisations coming and hope to provide ideas for the variety of actions people can take, as well as the usual stalls, games, and refreshments.
- **General information.** We do not produce notices for boards at the moment, but are considering displaying them on an ad hoc basis related to themes. We did a prayer station for the prayer evenings and would be happy to be involved in similar events if required.

The Eco Team would like to thank everyone who has played a part in this work over the year, and we are keen to hear from anyone who has a passion for this area of ministry and any time to spare.

Cleaning

Community lunch – FiRs

Known as FiRs (Friends in Retirement) and costing £5 in 2025, we gathered monthly to provide a hot meal to older people. From March 2026, the name has changed to Community Lunch to make our lunches more welcoming and open to all. The price is now £6.

Tracy Bevan has now taken on the role of chef, but is very keen for more cooks to join the team. We meet on the 2nd Tuesday of the month, except

in August, so it might involve a commitment of twice a year to prepare a 2-course meal for around 30 people. Please speak to Tracy if you can help.

During the year, we said goodbye to Jackie Sanders, who has cooked many lunches over the years. She now comes along to enjoy food and fellowship.

We have those who have been coming along for many years, and some new faces. Barny, the owner of Caremark, a local home care company, has been coming along and helping to serve and wash up. Some months, he has brought along clients who are receiving support from Caremark.

We have a dedicated team who set up tables, serve food and help with the washing up. Andrew Cooper challenges us to engage our brains with his monthly quizzes.

In December, Ann Parsons joined us to play the piano so we could sing carols.

Gardening

Art at St. Mark's

In 2025, our vibrant programme of arts, heritage, and community events welcomed new faces and strengthened friendships within the church family.

- Two textile exhibitions from the Westhill Endowment, on Reconciliation and the Environment, prompted reflection on conflict, reconciliation, creation, and our shared responsibility for the earth.
- These inspired the Art at St Mark's series, which started with 'Contravanitas' in September, a play by congregation member Frederic Wyatt about freedom and ambition during the French Revolution.
- Heritage Open Day showcased our Grade II* listed church through tours, displays, and hospitality.
- Our community craft evening, Make, resumed in September with clay-making.
- October's Harvest Fair celebrated creation and promoted generosity.
- The Food and Faith Festival explored how food links culture, justice, environment, and spirituality, highlighting that faith grows through shared life.
- In November, Make enabled enthusiasts to craft Christmas gifts, and December's community event created festive table decorations.

These experiences made 2025 a year of confidence in our creativity, encouraging conversations about faith and inspiring us to become an outward-facing, imaginative church. As we look to 2026 and St Mark's 150th anniversary in 2029, we are encouraged by what has been started.

SWIGS – St Mark's Women's Inclusive Group Social

Over the past year, we've hosted our "St Mark's Women's Inclusive Group Social" ('SWIGS') evening once every 3-4 months. These gatherings have become a valued space where all who wish to attend are welcome to share a meal together.

Each evening has brought together around 20–30 people to share a delicious meal and enjoy activities such as quizzes, games, and opportunities to chill and chat. We've intentionally created space for people to move between groups during the evening, helping everyone connect with someone new and deepen relationships across the church community.

Every gathering has had its own theme, such as a summer Thai-inspired meal, an Italian theme, and a cosy winter night with stews and crumbles. Each event has aimed to offer a welcoming space to pause, laugh, talk and be together, developing our sense of belonging.

We hope that these evenings will continue to be a joyful and accessible way for people to connect, feel known, and grow in community together.

St Mark's Men's and Inclusive Group

We have been meeting over the last 18 months for evening curries or walk-and-pub evenings. Having a social group where we can spend time together is really important both for long-standing members of the church and for people newly exploring whether they want to be part of the church. We have also been joined by visiting friends or relatives, and this has always been enjoyable for everyone.

Conversation varies widely as we get to know each other. This is particularly important for family guys when Sunday morning can easily become "hunt my child – again", and it can be hard to move beyond remembering names or occupations.

Although we have some favourite venues, we are always happy to look at suggestions for other places to meet. We usually have between 25 and 40 coming on a Friday evening.

Most regulars are part of the WhatsApp group to communicate between gatherings.

Scouts

4th Leamington (St. Mark's)

In 2025, the Scout Group moved all sessions to Wednesday, so now we have Beavers (age 6-8), Cubs (age 8-10.5) and Scouts (age 10.5-14) all on the same evening. This has helped the leaders work together and made it more consistent for parents and young people as they transition through the sections.

Scouts

In September, our Scouts went on the biggest adventure we've organised – a weekend in London sleeping on HMS Belfast. The experience on the ship was amazing, with a private tour and the opportunity to learn what it was like for the sailors. Our Scouts raised the flag at sunrise, with amazing views of the city around. They also visited the Science Museum and Tower Bridge.

Other highlights for our Scouts include kayaking on the River Leam at night and a ghost walk in Stratford. Skills they have recently learned in the hall include building electric cars and making ice cream. They have represented the Group at the annual Remembrance parade to Leamington war memorial.

Cubs

The Cubs have benefitted from the range of District events on offer, including competing against other Cubs from Leamington at Sports Day, a Quiz Night, and the annual Swimming Gala.

Our Cubs regularly go off-site and have been climbing at Warwick University, Den Building at Oakley Wood, Orienteering at St Nicholas Park and playing Disc Golf at Quarry Park. In their sessions at the hall, they have been learning skills and teamwork, including navigation, fire lighting, cooking, first aid, and lots of games.

Beavers

The Beavers held a sleepover in Warwick Museum in October, a first night away from home for some. They learned about local history, tackled Lego challenges and enjoyed pizza and a movie before sleeping among the exhibits.

On a beautiful evening the Beavers went flying kites around Chesterton Windmill. They have also been bouldering and to a VR experience. The Beavers love having visitors and recently have had a scientist for "experiments week" and a visit from Leamington Police.

Group

In March, we will be taking over the “Art Box” – the phone box turned into a mini art gallery by Christchurch Gardens. Our Beavers, Cubs and Scouts will fill the box with their springtime creations.

We have been fundraising to buy a trailer for the Group. Our Beavers and Cubs have completed individual challenges to raise £20.25 each, and we have provided a tuck shop at the Sports Day. In total, we have raised £1100. The box trailer will enable us to move all our equipment to camp at once, and all the way to our pitch. In the future this means we can be more adventurous with our camping locations and go further afield.

In May, we will be taking 45 young people and 15 adults to Get In 2026 – Warwickshire Scouts County Camp, which takes place every 4 years at Ragley Hall. There will be 4,000+ attendees, and the weekend will be packed with activities.

Rainbows

Over the past year, St Mark’s Rainbows have worked enthusiastically toward their bronze, silver, and gold awards. The girls have enjoyed completing Interest Badges, Skill Builders, Unit Awards, and more, and more than half of the Unit has earned at least one award during the year.

A strong focus on recycling and environmental care has shaped many of our activities. The Rainbows especially enjoyed a visit from Sophie from St Mark’s Church, who spoke to them about how we can all help to care for our planet. They were also captivated by a talk from the Warwickshire Bee Association, which taught them more about bees and their importance in the natural world.



The Rainbows took part in bug hunts at Foundry Woods, where they had a wonderful time engaging with the leaders and exploring the natural surroundings. They continue to enjoy taking part in events at St Mark's and were thrilled to celebrate with Lucy, one of our Rainbows, when she was baptised at the beginning of the year.

As part of their involvement with church life, the Unit helped create a beautiful Harvest flower arrangement. They also spent time learning about 3 important saints—George, David, and Patrick—across 3 meetings. Later in the year, the Unit was delighted when another Rainbow chose to explore baptism at St Mark's.

Throughout the year, the girls have enjoyed a variety of activities, including mapping, cooking, climbing, and learning the importance of friendship, kindness, and helping one another.



We also celebrated several achievements within our leadership team. Moira, our Unit Helper, received her 10-year Service Award, and our

Young Leader Eva completed her qualification. Julie, our Unit Leader, was honoured with Freedom of the District by Warwickshire District Council.

We were saddened by the loss of Eileen Griffin in November—a devoted and much-loved member of our Unit. She is greatly missed by Rainbows and Leaders alike. In her memory, fruit trees have been planted at the Rescue Ranch Animal Sanctuary, which the Unit visited during the year.
